Roy was the husband of Irene (Hrubovcak) Calabrese and he was born in Calabria, Italy. He was the son of the late Joseph and Mary Calabrese. Roy was a World War II veteran, serving in both the U.S. Army and U.S. Air Force. He worked as a postal employee in Newtown from 1962 to 1990, when he retired. The Return of RJ-S 41-35253 Mr. Shorty/Black Magic IV



Some of you will remember in your visits to England after the war that there was a museum on Earls Colne Airfield called the Rebel Air Museum. The centerpiece or this museum was the tail section of a B-26 Martin Marauder from the 323rd BG 454th Squadron. The serial number was 41-35253 called Mr. Shorty/Black

Magic IV its radio call sign was RJ-S. Also displayed was an incredibly detailed model of a 454th Squadron hardstand at Earls Colne airfield created by Steven Siviter.

The museum was originally started at Andrewsfield by Stan Brett in 1978 and run by volunteers to honor the memory of the men from the 322^{nd} and 323^{rd} Bomb Groups. When Stan passed in 1978 the museum was then moved from Andrewsfield to Earls Colne by his son David.



RJ-S first came to the 454th Squadron in the spring of 1944. On her first mission, June 12, 1944, she was flown by Lt. Howard Jenks to Cherisy, France. The target was a railroad bridge. By the end of WWII 41-35253 had completed 96 missions. Her last being to take out the German Me-262 air base located at Erding, Germany on April 25, 1945. The pilot for that mission was Lt. Dick Gray. This was

also the last WWII mission flown by the 323rd Bomb Group.

At wars end Mr. Shorty's fate was similar to that all of the other B-26 Marauders. On June 1, 1945 she was declared scrap and then flown off to the scrap yard, a sad ending for a very proud bird. However instead of being ferried to Landsberg, Germany to be cut up for scrap as most B-26s were, 41-35253 and other 323rd BG Marauders were flown to the 9th Air Force Service depot at Burtonwood, England.



There she lay for some years until finally being hauled off to the Warrington scrap yard. Mason Hise of the RAF Burtonwood Association was kind enough to supply us with the picture of RJ-S at the left cut up on the ground at Burtonwood.

Her remains were discovered at the scrap yard in Warrington England in 1974 by the

Duxford Aviation Society. Duxford passed them on the Rebel Air Museum for display in the early 80's. Unfortunately by then, time, weather and the elements had taken their toll on RJ-S and the tail fuselage was the only salvageable section. She remained on display at the Rebel air Museum until the 90's when, unfortunately the museum ran into financial difficulties and had to close. At this point the aircraft vanishes until now.

This past February I had an e-mail forwarded to me from Andrew Boehley of the Marauder Historical Society. John Camp from the Boxted Airfield Historical Group had contacted him inquiring about 41-35253 RJ-S. The Boxted Historical Group is in the process of building a small museum at Boxted airfield and RJ-S is going to be on display there. Boxted airfield was home to the 386th Bomb Group from June 10, 1943 until September 24, 1943.

John and I started exchanging e-mails and I found out that when The Rebel Air Museum failed, ownership of RJ-S past on to the trustees of Marks Hall. The trustees then placed the tail section into storage. Marks Hall was an Elizabethan Manor house on the edge of Earls Colne airfield that was used as a headquarters building by both the 8th and the 9th Air Forces. It is now a beautiful gardens and arboretum. Sadly they were unable to save the manor house itself. It fell into disrepair after the war and was torn down in the 60's.

At the end of last year the Trustees of Marks Hall Estate agreed to loan RJ-S to the Boxted Historical Group for display at their museum. So on January 16th of this year the group traveled to Earls Colne and moved 41-35253 the 18 or so miles to Boxted Airfield. For those of you with computers, you can go to the website "YouTube" and see a video of them moving RJ-S. Do a search on "Marauder film by Richard". I have been working with John Camp providing him with pictures and information about RJ-S that they are going to incorporate at part of their exhibit. If any of you have additional pictures or information about 41-35253 RJ-S Mr. Shorty/Black Magic IV

that you would like to share with them, please contact me and I will forward in on to John and the museum.

The Boxted Airfield Museum is going to have its grand opening this coming May the 29th at 11 am. Additional video and slide shows of them building the Boxted Museum can be found on the "YouTube" website. Since Boxted Airfield was once home to a B-26 Marauder Bomb group the museum is very excited to be able to show this very unique piece of Marauder history. Other then the B-26 that is now on display at the Paris Air and Space Museum, 41-35253 RJ-S is believed to be the largest surviving piece of a B-26 Marauder in all of Europe. This is a very distinctive honor for not only the 454th Bomb Squadron but also the 323rd Bomb Group.

There is also a bit of irony in all of this. During WWII the 323rd BG was identified by a white bar on the top of its B-26 tails. The 386th BG was identified by a yellow bar on the top of its B-26 tails. Since most film and pictures taken during WWII were shot in black and white, the 386th BG was often misidentified as the 323rd BG because in the black and white pictures the yellow identifying bar came out looking white. So we got some photo credit for pictures that were shot of their missions. Now, over 65 years later where does the last surviving 323rd BG B-26 Marauder which ends up being displayed at, a 386th BG airbase! Who says fate doesn't have a sense of humor.

Earls Colne Train Station



I recently received another e-mail from the United Kingdom. This one was from Nick Ellis. Nick is with the Colne Valley Railway Preservation society. They were formed to preserve the section of the Colne Valley Railway that ran between Chappel and Wakes in Essex and Haverhill in Suffolk. They are now also in the process of establishing a

They are keen to represent the part that the Colne Valley railroads and rail stations played in the war. They are looking for any pictures, recollections or information regarding the roles of the railroads and stations in moving men or war supplies into and

out of the Earls Colne area whether it was just for leave or part of the war effort. If you have anything you would like to share with the museum, please let me know.

WASP Gold Medal Revisited



Many of you are aware of a group of women who served as pilots during WWII. They were called The Women Airforce Service Pilots or their better known name of the WASPs. Formed in August of 1943, 1074 of them served in WWII. 38 of them made the ultimate sacrifice and were killed while serving their country. These were all ground breaking

pioneers paving the way for future generations of women in aviation.

On July 1, 2009 President Obama signed into law Senate Bill 614 awarding all WWII WASP pilots the Congressional Gold Medal. This was a long overdue and highly deserved recognition for their service to our country during the time of war.

One of this countries highest awards, The Congressional Gold Medal is only awarded by two thirds vote of the House and Senate. On March 10, 2010 at an event attended by over 200 WWII WASP the medal was awarded to the group by Speaker Nancy Pelosi, Rep. John Boehner, Sen. Harry Reid and Sen. Mitch McConnell. It is a beautiful gold medal showing the WASPs and a T-45 on the front and a B-26, P-39 and T-45 plus a set of pilot's wings on the back.

What many of you are probably not aware of is a growing controversy that is currently brewing over one of the findings that was listed in Senate Bill 614.

One of the greatest problems any historian faces is revisionist history. Errors, some small some great start to creep into the historical record as time goes by. This is especially true in today's multimedia fast paced communications world of the internet and personal blogs. Anybody can post whatever they want to a website or blob and the facts are not always verified or contested.

This is what happened in the case of Senate Bill 614 that was signed into law on July 1, 2009. Section 1 of the bill lists 33 findings or accomplishments of the WASPs during the war. These are major facts and achievements accomplished by the group on which the gold medal is based. All of these facts are correct except for one, Finding #17. It reads and I quote: "(17) in October 1943, male pilots were refusing to fly the B-26 Martin Marauder (known as the 'Widowmaker') because of its fatality records,

and General Arnold ordered WASP Director, Jacqueline Cochran, to select 25 WASP to be trained to fly the B-26 to prove to the male pilots that it was safe to fly;"

We know from history that by October 1943, B-26 Marauder units had already served with great distinction in the Pacific theaters of operations, providing a stop gap against Japanese forces in that area. In addition by October 1943 the Martin B-26 Marauder and her crews had proved and were proving to be very successful in the Mediterranean and European theatres of operation. If pilots were refusing to fly the B-26 then how by October 1943 had it acquired such an outstanding combat record? As I said earlier this is revisionist history. In this incident the revision was used to bolster the case for a gold medal. A totally unfounded assertion added to an already outstanding list of WASP accomplishments that spoke for itself many times over!

There is a movement afoot to have that finding removed from the record. Not to have the medal revoked mind you, everyone concurs that award is highly deserved and was long overdue in its coming, but just to have the historical record corrected. To some of you Veterans I'm sure the language of Finding # 17 is not that big a deal. It was just an overstatement in the exuberance of the moment. To some it will be. However I do not believe any group should have to promote themselves by denigrating another and when all is said and done it is after all still revisionist history.

Letters to the WASP Association have been written asking their help in correcting this matter but to date all have gone unanswered. French Legion of Honor Medal



Some time ago I wrote an article about the French government's decision to award the French Legion of Honor Medal to WWII Veterans. This medal is still available to any living U.S. WWII Veterans who helped to liberate France. Only 100 of these medals are given out each year in the U.S. The National Order of the Legion of Honor was started in 1802 by Napoleon Bonaparte in recognition of service to France.

Applications for the award are taken by one of the ten French Consulates that cover the area where you live; Atlanta, Boston, Chicago, Houston, Los Angles, Miami, New Orleans, New York, San Francisco, or Washington D.C.. If you go to their website http://ambafrance-us.org there is a map that shows the states each consulate covers plus contact information. Applicants will need to submit written documentation which shows a campaign combat record in France during their war years. This would normally be a copy of your form 53-55 which is on the back of your discharge papers. They will also want copies of any awards or medals you received during the war. When submitting your paper work DO NOT send any original records, just copies. The whole process will probably take more then a year. During this time the records and paperwork are all sent back to France for review and approval. Some records have been lost while this process was ongoing. Also, keep in mind that just submitting the application doesn't necessarily mean you will be awarded the medal. There have been some Marauder Men who submitted applications and for whatever reason didn't receive the medal.

The Legion of Honor is always presented at a ceremony either at the regional French Consulate office or in France with the honoree and their family present. To date only four Marauder Men have received the medal. They were Even Cook – 397^{th} BG 599^{th} Sq, Phil Henderson – 323^{rd} BG 454^{th} Sq, Nathan Kline – 323^{rd} BG 454^{th} Sq and finally Ralph Waldrop – 320^{th} BG 444^{th} Sq. If any other Marauder Men have received this medal please advise me. The MHS is keeping a record of all who receive it.

We in the 323rd Bomb Group have reason to be very proud because two of those recipients are from the 454th Squadron, Phil Henderson and Nathan Kline.



Phil on the right in this picture received his medal this past summer on July 20th with his family present during a very nice ceremony that was held for him by his local VFW chapter in Michigan. Shown on the left in this picture with Phil is Even Cook from the 397th BG 599th Squadron. The picture was taken at MHS headquarters in Tucson Arizona where Phil spends his winters helping Andrew Boehley, the MHS Historian catalog the memorabilia, pictures and records that Marauder Men have sent into the MHS archives.

Born in Georgetown, Illinois Phil earned his pilots license in July of 1941. He enlisted in the Army Aviation Cadet program in the fall of 1942 and graduated in 1943 as a brand new 2nd Lieutenant. Next it was onto B-

26 Marauder training at Dodge City, Kansas. From there he picked up a new crew plus a shiny new B-26 Martin Marauder and headed for England and the war via the Northern Route. There he was assigned to our group and squadron. Phil completed 40 forty combat missions during the war before returning to the US in the summer of 1945. After the war Phil stayed active as a pilot in the US Air Force Reserve flying as a C-46 pilot flying out of O'Hare Airport. He retired from the Air Force in 1968 as a Lt. Colonel.

This was a richly deserved award for Phil, not only because of his outstanding war and Air Force record but also for all the hard work he has provided in organizing the 323rd BG records at the MHS archives!



Our second recipient of the National Order of the Legion of Honor is Nathan Kline. Raised in Allentown, Pennsylvania Nathan was attending Muhlenberg College in Pennsylvania in 1942 when he felt the call of his country during wartime. Enlisting he was assigned to the Quartermaster Crops attached to the Army Air Corp as a clerk and sent off to England. This was due to the fact that his vision was only 20/40. However Nathan wanted to fly!

Undaunted, he started to bum rides out at the airfield on training missions with any pilot that would take him. Eventually due to the shortage of aircrew personnel Nathan was able to transfer into the 323rd BG 454th Squadron as a Togglier/Bombardier completing 65 combat missions and receiving the Distinguished Flying Cross in the process. After the war he stayed in the Air Force Reserve retiring as a Major.


Nathan, pictured above, was very lucky and received his medal on June 6, 2009 in Paris, France during the 65th anniversary commemorations for D-Day. The ceremony took place at Omaha Beach, present were President Obama, President Sharkazy of France, Prime Minister Brown of England, Prime Minister Harper of Canada, Prince Charles of England, Senator Dole and actor Tom Hanks. Needless to say, it was quite an impressive ceremony!








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323rd Bomb Group Need To Know Pictures
