Once again, we were very pleased to hear that everyone who attended our Tulsa Reunion had a great time and arrived home safely. **On Wednesday (September 21<sup>st</sup>)** at 2:00pm we kicked off the reunion with our registration table set-up in the Hospitality Room as we opened for another year of fun and good times. As the day continued all our members came in as scheduled. Again this year, our Hospitality Room opened on time fully stocked and ready to see old friends, listen to stories and share laughs with each other since our last reunion.

**On Thursday (September 22<sup>nd</sup>)** we met out in front of the hotel at 12:30pm ready to board our bus to go and see the city of Tulsa. Our bus arrived early so we boarded up and we began our tour. It started to downtown where we picked up our tour guide and our first landmark was the beautiful Boston Avenue United Methodist Church which was built 1925-1929. This was the third location the church had because they kept outgrowing their other churches. This church sits in the heart of Tulsa. It is an art deco building with its 15 story tower and was designated as a historic landmark in 1999. This is also the church that Scott and Debbie McEachin were married. There are a lot of interesting facts about this church so, if you are interested you can visit their website bostonavenue.org for all the details.

From there we continued our city tour looking at additional churches (2 which the above congregation outgrew) downtown. The one thing that I must say there have been a lot of churches on our last four reunion city tours. We saw a lot of buildings with the initials WP on them. The Phillips oil family had twin sons one became an architectural engineer and had the initials WP placed on the buildings he had built. This was in honor of his brother whose life was tragically cut short. So, his twin brother dedicated all the buildings to him. These were around 1900 to 1920. We saw there minor league baseball stadium. Where it is built there's virtually no parking for the fans. So I guess if it's a really big game some fans will have a hike to get to the park. We also saw the old train station that was a very important location for many years. Unfortunately it is not in use at this time since the demise of the railway system for passenger use. During the turn of the 20<sup>th</sup> century Tulsa was the richest city in the nation due to the fields and oil industry. It is still the corporate office for Phillips 66 and also QT convenience stores chain.

Now we dropped off our tour guide, left the downtown area, and went out to the Air Museum which was small but quite interesting. Upon completion of our tour here we went back to the hotel.

**On Friday (September 23<sup>rd</sup>)** once again we met out front of the hotel around 11:30am. Our bus arrived a little early so we boarded up for our tour today. However, we stopped for lunch on the way and since we left early we got a little additional time for lunch. Where we stopped for lunch we had a lot of choices and you were on your own. Warren went peacefully to be with Jesus on July 12, 2016 at the Rouse Home. He was born on April 13, 1920 to the late George and Flossie Boyer. After graduating from Warren High School he entered the U.S. Air Force on December 8, 1941. He received training to the rank of Sergeant at Chanute Air Force Base followed by Staff Sergeant training in Las Vegas after which he was transferred to McDill AFB where he joined the 454th Squadron of the 323rd Bomb Group. During WWII he flew numerous missions over England, France, Germany and Austria in a B-26 Marauder.

He was honorably discharged on October 21, 1945 as a Staff Sergeant with a good conduct metal and 4 bronze

stars. Following his military service he married the late Rachel C. Brian on December 8, 1945. He was employed by Delux Metal Interoyal for 41 years and after retiring from there he worked for 13 years for PNC Bank.

He was a member of North Star Lodge 241 F&AM, Warren County Shrine Club, and Occidental Royal Arch chapter. He was also a member of the Moose Club and life member of the American legion. He was also a long time member of First Lutheran Church in Warren.

## WWII bombardier Norman 'Rock' Rosner, 90

Sunday, February 14, 2010

Growing up north of Baltimore, Norman "Rock" Rosner was the youngest of eight rambunctious



siblings known as the Rosner Roughnecks. He earned his nickname in high school for his prodigious boxing skills. He and his brothers Larry and Adolph, known as "Ace," often roamed the woods near their home in Sudbrook Park, carrying rifles slung over their shoulders to target vermin.

When World War II broke out in Europe, the youngest Rosner Roughneck was so eager to join the fight that he dropped out of the University of Alabama to enlist in the Royal Canadian Air Force for flight training. After the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor, Larry and Ace joined the Army as infantrymen, and Rock Rosner returned home to continue flight training with the Army Air Forces.He served multiple tours in Europe and later in Korea, advancing through the ranks and developing a reputation as a highly decorated intelligence officer. He achieved the rank of lieutenant colonel and was a linguist and paratrooper trained to use the highest technology communications equipment.

His job often required him to engage in top-secret missions deep behind enemy lines. He became known as an expert on escape and evasion tactics and helped write the Pentagon's official text on the subject. "He had a wildly can-do attitude," said his son, Roger, a vice president for Apple. "He would fly off to this crazy land and just wouldn't question it."

Norman Morton Rosner was born April 14, 1919, in Birmingham, Ala. His family moved to Maryland when he was an infant. During World War II, then-Lt. Rosner served as a bombardier with a B-26 squadron in Essex, England. He sat in a plexiglass bubble in the nose of the aircraft, armed with a machine gun. He flew on more than 62 bombing missions, and his crew often returned to base with a plane so shot up that it appeared to be as airworthy as a sieve.

His decorations included two awards of the Distinguished Flying Cross and 12 awards of the Air Medal.

In the late 1940s, Rock Rosner received specialized Japanese language training through the military and at Yale University. He was sent to Korea as a counterintelligence officer. After evading enemy forces there, he was awarded the Bronze Star Medal.

He retired from the Air Force in 1965 and shortly afterward joined the State Department's Office of Public Safety as a Foreign Service officer. He held posts in Vietnam, Thailand and Brazil, then moved to suburban Maryland in the early 1970s when he was assigned to the State Department's Washington-based narcotics control division. His job there was to allot funding for crop eradication abroad. He retired in 1993. Col. Rosner credited his wife with saving his life and his career. In the late 1950s, he contracted polio. The muscles in his throat were paralyzed, and he lost significant muscle mass. Air Force doctors told him he would not recover and would be medically retired because of his condition.

With his wife's help, Col. Rosner began a health and exercise regimen that included acupuncture, swimming and weight training. She helped nurse him back to health, and they moved to the United States in the early 1960s.

Col. Rosner, 90, died of colon cancer Jan. 26 at the National Naval Medical Center with his wife by his side. Despite the military's initial doubts about their marriage, the Rosners were together for 52 years.

EICHEL, SHELDON, "Shelly", passed away unexpectedly on April 28, 2015. Born November 28, 1924 in Brooklyn, NY. He was a US World War II Pilot and pilot for Israel Independence War. He loved story telling was seen in PBS documentary A Wing and a Prayer that aired this month. A true friend who will be greatly missed by all.

Roland P. Laferriere 1925 – 2016



Longtime Wilbraham resident, Roland P. "Lefty" Laferriere, 91, died peacefully on Tuesday, April 26, 2016, at home, surrounded by his family. Born in Chicopee to the late Auguste and Yvonne (Hamel) Laferriere, he was a proud Army Air Force Veteran of World War II, where he earned the Air Medal with three clusters, the French Croix de Guerre, a Presidential unit citation, and the European Theatre ribbon with two campaign stars. A graduate of

Boston University, he worked at Mass Mutual Life Insurance Co. for 35 years, retiring as a Senior Vice President in 1986.

A communicant of St. Cecilia's Church in Wilbraham, he belonged to Wilbraham Country Club and was previously a member of Longmeadow Country Club for many years. He served as Chairman for the United Way, was on the Board of Directors for Stage West and belonged to the Colony Club for many years. An avid Red Sox fan, he enjoyed attending his grandchildren's sporting events, travelling with his wife Doris and spending summers with his family in Ogunquit, ME. He is survived by his beloved wife of 69 years Doris (Gamache) Laferriere, two daughters; Lee Ann Laferriere-Bates and her husband Richard and Suzanne Gougeon and her husband Michael and 4 cherished grandchildren; Gabrielle and Noelle Bates and Maxwell and Noah Gougeon, all of Wilbraham.

## <u>323<sup>rd</sup> BG Commemorative/Challenge Coin</u>



At one of our reunions, George Cornett, our Squadron Secretary suggested we look into the possibility of producing a 323<sup>rd</sup> BG legacy coin. The coin would be another way of paying tribute to our Veterans and commemorating their service and sacrifices for our freedom. Since many

of our fathers, grandfather and uncles have already left us, it would also be a little memento that we could carry with us on a daily basis to connect us to them and honor their memories.

It took a few years to work out all the details but I am happy to announce that our commemorative coin is finally available. One of the items that gave us the most problems was the centerpiece of our coin, the B-26 Martin Marauder. We just couldn't seem to get a really decent representation image for our coin from the vendor with whom we were working. The problem lay in the fact that instead of submitting a picture of the B-26 image you wanted to the foundry, it had to be submitted as a drawing in a vector graphic or line art.

Through the years, as 323<sup>rd</sup> BG Historian, I have made many friends all over the world. It was one of our great friends from the England that came to our rescue, Ken Stanton. Ken is an aviation artist and we have work on several projects together in the past. One of these was an oil portrait of a 455<sup>th</sup> Squadron B-26 "Mission Belle". I explained our problem to Ken and he was kind enough to offer his artistic services to us for free. Ken drew a beautiful detailed line art rendition of "Rock Hill Special/Lucky Graki for our coin. It's really ashamed that a lot of the subtle details of his drawing were lost in the miniaturization of the drawing for our coin. Looking at the B-26 on our coin in the picture above you can get some idea of how excellent his original drawing was.

Thanks Ken not only our B-26 drawing but also for your dedication in keeping alive the memories of all our Allied Veterans. We all really appreciate the work you did for us. In recognition of all the hard work Ken has done for us and all veterans he is being presented with a 323<sup>rd</sup> BG Commemorative coin. Consider yourself an honorary member of the 454<sup>th</sup> Squadron and the 323<sup>rd</sup> Bomb Group. Welcome to the family!

Our coin is made of brass with raised lettering and is 1 3/4/ inches in diameter and depicts the story 323<sup>rd</sup> BG and her Veterans. Each image on the coin has historic significance and was place there for a reason. Rather than take up a lot of space here in our newsletter I have attached a fact sheet to the back this newsletter that describes the coin and why every item is on it. The coins are \$20 each which includes shipping. Order forms are attached to the back of our newsletter. You can carry your 323<sup>rd</sup> BG coin with the same pride that our Veterans had for their service with the 323<sup>rd</sup> Bomb Group.

These are just a few of the words that Major General Sentman read from the French Consul's letter to Bob Laudie and George Dane on Friday, August 5<sup>th</sup> in Iowa City when they were presented with their medals by the Major General.

Bob was a lead Bombardier with the 454<sup>th</sup> Squadron. He flew 73 combat missions with us out of Earls Colne, England including our first mission on July 16, 1943 and the allimportant D-Day mission on June 6, 1944. In the picture above Bob is being interviewed by a KCRG camera crew out of Cedar Rapids. Iowa. In the interview Bob said he accepted his medal not only for himself but dedicated his medal to all the 323<sup>rd</sup> BG Veterans who he wished could have been there with him that day to also receive a medal. However, one of the more poignant moments of their visit had to be David's lying of a wreath at the memorial on the airbase which was dedicated to all the airmen who ever flew out of the Earls Colne airfield. Their stay was capped off by a visit to the Earls Colne Heritage Museum.

#### MHS Taped Interviews



In keeping with our "preserving their legacy" theme, I want to remind you that the Marauder Historical Society has videotaped interviews with some of our Veterans. Between 1990 and 1994 Dick Ellinger, from the MHS traveled around the country videotaping the WWII stories of hundreds of Marauder Men. Dick's efforts constitute one of the most important historical archives, not only for WWII veterans but for the historical records of the B-26 Marauder. Every WWII Veteran has a story

to tell. Because of Dick's efforts future generation will be able to hear the actual WWII stories from the Veterans who actually lived them. The interviews were originally recorded on VHS tape. 323<sup>rd</sup> Bomb Group Commemorative/Challenge Coin



To honor the memory and sacrifice of our 323<sup>rd</sup> BG Veterans, the members of the 454<sup>th</sup> Squadron Association decided to create a Commemorative/Challenge Coin.

#### What is a Challenge Coin

Challenge coins or medallions are customarily issued by a group or organization to prove membership in that group or unit. The coins may also be given as a reward to an individual who has performed some type of outstanding service for that group. The coin usually depicts some form of the group's insignia.

Challenges are issued to ensure group members or others issued a coin as a reward, are carrying their coins. Challenges are limited to members of the group who have been issued a coin. The rules for issuing a challenge vary from group to group. Generally, this is the way it works; at any time or place when two or more members of that group meet, any member in that group may issue a coin challenge. This is normally done by either holding your coin in the air, or placing it on a table or bar and verbally stating that you are initiating a coin challenge. Challenges may also be "accidently" issued if someone in the group drops their coin and the coin makes an audible sound when it hits the floor.

The proper response for those being issue a challenge is to immediately produce their unit coin. If challenged and unable to show your coin, you must buy a round of drinks for the challenger and the group members present. If everyone produces their coin then the challenger must buy a round of drinks for all the group members present.

#### The 323<sup>rd</sup> BG Coin

Our Commemorative coin honors it's Veterans through the depiction of their history.

At the top of the coin, in the outer ring, is of course our name, the 323<sup>rd</sup> Bomb Group. On the bottom part of the outer ring is U.S. Army Air Forces, the branch of service to which the 323<sup>rd</sup> BG belonged. You will note the name is divided by the insignia for the U.S. Army Air Forces. At the left and right sides of the ring you will see two stars. These two stars honor Major General John O. Moench USAF, a two star general, the highest rank achieved by a 323<sup>rd</sup> BG veteran during their service with the U.S. Air Force.

Going back to the top of the coin, this time in the inner circle at the twelve o'clock position is the insignia for the 323<sup>rd</sup> Bomb Group. To its left at the eleven o'clock position is the insignia, for the 8<sup>th</sup> Air Force. This was the Air Force to which the 323<sup>rd</sup> BG was first assigned when it started to fly combat missions on July 16, 1943. To the right of the 323<sup>rd</sup> BG insignia at the one o'clock position is the insignia for the 9<sup>th</sup> Air Force. The 323<sup>rd</sup> BG was reassigned to the 9<sup>th</sup> Air Force on October 16, 1943 when the 9<sup>th</sup> was moved up to the European Theater of Operations from the Mediterranean Theater of Operations and restructured to handle tactical bombing and support in the ETO.

In the center of our coin is the Glenn Martin B-26 Marauder, the aircraft the 323<sup>rd</sup> Bomb Group flew during WWII. Depicted here is the B-26 that completed the most combat missions with the 323<sup>rd</sup> Bomb Group, named "Rock Hill Special/Lucky Gracki", serial number 41-34853 coded RJ-N from the 454<sup>th</sup> Squadron. It completed 196 missions and survived the war. Take note of the white bar on the tail of RJ-N. This is how the 323<sup>rd</sup> BG aircraft were identified from other bomb groups, by this white bar. It is from this white bar that we drew our nickname "The White Tailed Marauders". Above and below the aircraft is the name B-26 Marauder. The colors used for the lettering and outer ring of our coin are red, white and blue the very same colors as used on our national flag.

Finally, at the bottom of the inner circle, in the six o'clock position is the runway layout for Earls Colne, England, the airbase from which we flew our very first combat mission in 1943.

Turning the coin over, in the outer ring are the names of the 323<sup>rd</sup> BG's four Squadrons with a star honoring each Squadron, the 453<sup>rd</sup>, 454<sup>th</sup>, 455<sup>th</sup>, and 456<sup>th</sup> Squadrons. Moving to the inner circle next to each Squadron name is the insignia for that Squadron.

At the top and bottom of the inner circle you'll see 318 combat missions. This is the number of missions the 323<sup>rd</sup> Bomb Group completed during the war.

On the left and right sides at the nine o'clock and three o'clock positions are the years 1942 and 1945. These are the years the 323<sup>rd</sup> BG was formed and then deactivated at the end of WWII.

Every 323<sup>rd</sup> Bomb Group Veteran had a story and our commemorative coin keeps their memories alive as well as honoring them and their legacy!
